From the Desk of the Town Manager

Protecting Our Resources Is A Team Effort



The Town of Canandaigua is blessed to have an abundance of natural resources including our beautiful lake, magnificent farmland, hearty forests, environmentally sensitive wetlands, and of course, our people.

Over the past six years, the Town has been fortunate to have over one hundred community members volunteer regularly to make our community a better place to live, work, and play through their help in the creation and implementation of the Town's Comprehensive Plan; Open Space, Conservation, and Scenic Views Master Plan (2018); Transfer of Development Rights Report (2017); Agricultural Enhancement Plan (2016); Sustainable Stormwater Management for Sucker Brook (2015); Natural Resource Inventory; Sewer Master Plan; Water Master Plan; Historical Survey of the Town of Canandaigua (2019); and many others. These residents have enabled us to achieve results that are unmatched thanks to volunteering their time and bringing their perspective forward.

These documents have been used to achieve real results like the creation of two water quality improvement projects to help keep pollutants out of Canandaigua Lake, the planned expansion of

water and sewer lines in a manner that is compatible with the protection of farmland, the extinguishment of development rights and permanent protection of over two thousand acres of farmland, and many more achievements.

Recently, the Town and our Citizen's Implementation Committee (the group charged with implementing the Town's Comprehensive Plan) kicked off three new project teams to focus on goals for 2020 including:

- **Tree Project Team:** understanding the role that individual trees and forests play in both ecological and public health and welfare and how a healthy community forest is beneficial to the well being of residents and visitors; the tree team is evaluating and planning for the maintenance of publicly owned trees in Town parks, lands, cemeteries, and in the rights-of-way along Town roads.
- **Gateway Signage Team:** whose purpose is to propose welcome signage at all major gateways into the Town of Canandaigua.
- **Conservation Team:** will evaluate existing and potential programs to promote the conservation of our natural resources including ways of protecting lands through conservation easements, and also propose regulatory revisions to enhance the conservation of our natural resources.

These three project teams are just getting started. If you would be interested in contributing to one of these teams please let us know, all are welcome. If you came to our kick-off and joined one of our new teams, please know the Town and all of its representatives are very grateful for your time and dedication.

If you are unable to join one of our teams currently, that is no problem; however, please know your comments are always welcome (and encouraged). If you have any questions about any of these project teams or any other matter, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Environmental Committee Bulletin Plastic Bag Ban: What You Need To Know

Starting March 1, 2020, a new bag waste reduction law will take effect in New York State - where over 23 billion plastic bags are typically used each year. Plastic bag usage affects both our communities and environment. Plastic bags can be seen stuck in trees, as litter in our neighborhoods, and floating in our waterways. From the significant recycling and disposal issues they pose to the harm they can do to wildlife, the negative impacts of plastic bags are easily seen.

As a consumer, you can help and **#BYOBAGNY** - Bring Your Own Bag. Keep reusable bags in your car, or clip folding reusable bags onto your commuting bag or purse so you always have them handy. If you store them near the door or coat closet, you'll be more likely to remember them on the way out. Remember that every time you use a reusable bag, you are doing your part to prevent litter and waste. Using reusable bags makes sense and is the right thing to do. You can also remind your family, friends, and neighbors to bring their reusable bags whenever they shop.

The Bag Waste Reduction Law applies to more than just grocery stores. Whether you're going to the grocery store, clothes shopping, or to a home improvement store, make sure to bring your reusable bags.

Types of Bags You Can Use

While shoppers can bring any type of bag -- including film plastic -- note that there are many alternatives to choose from which are more environmentally friendly. Ideally, a bag should be washable and designed for multiple uses, such as one made from cloth. If you forget to bring a bag with you, many retailers will have reusable bags for sale. An alternative, such as paper, may also be available. Please note that stores are not required

to have bags available for customers. Some stores may choose not to switch to paper and may only have reusable bags for purchase. That is why it is important for consumers to **#BYOBagNY** - Bring Your Own Bag. If you have a small purchase, such as a magazine, candy or drink, you can help our environment by saying "No thank you" to a single use paper bag and carrying the item instead.

Recycling Plastic Bags and Plastic Films

Please remember these materials should never be included with your household recycling and must be recycled separately at a retailer or in the yellow tote at the Town of Canandaigua Transfer Station.

Count Me In!

The second week in March, the US Census will be sending out mailers to remind everyone to register for the census. You can send your information in 3 different ways: fill in a form on the internet, a phone call to the census, or by mail. If you do not have access to a computer, area libraries have them available for use, and there will be many Census events. Here is a sample [Census form](#).

Why is this important??

Other than being required by the US Constitution, the census count is used to determine Federal funding and our community's representation in the Government.

This once in a decade count factors into vital funding for roads, schools (don't forget to include the kids in your information), fire departments, and other important programs including Medicaid.

An under-count of only 16,000 people statewide could cause the loss of a Congressional Seat for NY.

Is it Safe?

The census bureau does not send out unsolicited e-mails and will never ask for social security numbers, bank accounts, or request money or donations.

By the end of July, if you ignore the initial mailing and the follow up mailings, a census worker may knock on your door. If this happens to you, be sure that they have a valid US Census ID badge that will have their photo, a US Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date.

Local History Notes



HUNN CEMETERY REVOLUTIONARY WAR VETERANS

At the corner of Bristol Road and Woolhouse Road in the Town of Canandaigua is a cemetery containing markers showing some of the oldest burials in the Town. While many of the monuments have deteriorated due to age and effects of being in the elements for so long, there is a wealth of information for anyone curious about some of the founding members of Canandaigua.

This cemetery contains burials from a substantial number of local families, including names such as Holcomb, Ackley, Nethaway, Grant, Mack, Hicks, Booth, Hubbard, Briggs and Spears. The most recent date found on a monument is the death in 1931 of Martha L. Spears. The oldest date found was the death in September 1799 of Seth Holcomb.

Hunn Cemetery is also the final resting place for many Veterans of the American Revolutionary War. Some of them settled here as a part of General John Sullivan's 'scorched earth' raid on the Seneca communities while others came later after news of the fertile soils spread among European settlers.

RAINFALL as a RESOURCE



What's happening to the water cycle?

As we develop our land and increase the amount of paved surfaces and buildings (known as impervious cover), the water cycle is changed. Less rainfall and snowmelt sinks into the ground and more water flows rapidly over the land into our lakes, rivers and estuaries. Stormwater runoff can lead to increased flooding, erosion and pollution and decreased groundwater recharge during dry periods.

As impervious surfaces increase, the problems associated with stormwater quality also increase. Stormwater can contain pollutants such as sediment, nutrients, bacteria and chemicals that can threaten aquatic health and contribute to the loss of water dependent recreational activities. Unmanaged stormwater is recognized nationally as the leading cause of water pollution today.

Conventional methods of land development collect and convey stormwater quickly into a series of drains and pipes that flow directly into the closest waterbody with little or no water quality treatment.

How can we help?

INSTALL A RAIN BARREL!

One of the easiest and most cost effective methods for conserving water and improving water quality is to INSTALL A RAIN BARREL. Rain barrels collect water from rooftops and store it for later use. The water can then be reused for a variety of water needs. Using a rain barrel at your home can:

- Capture a valuable resource that would otherwise be lost to storm drains
- Divert stormwater back to the landscape
- Conserve tap water and energy use
- Lower your water and utility bills

Installing a rain barrel is also an easy way to make your home environmentally friendly.

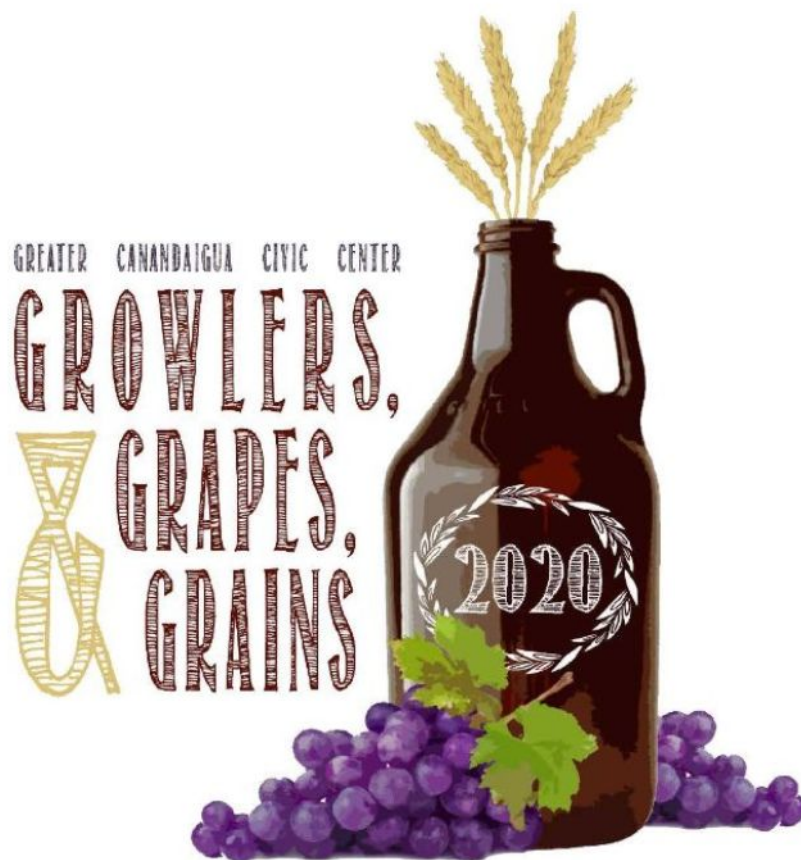

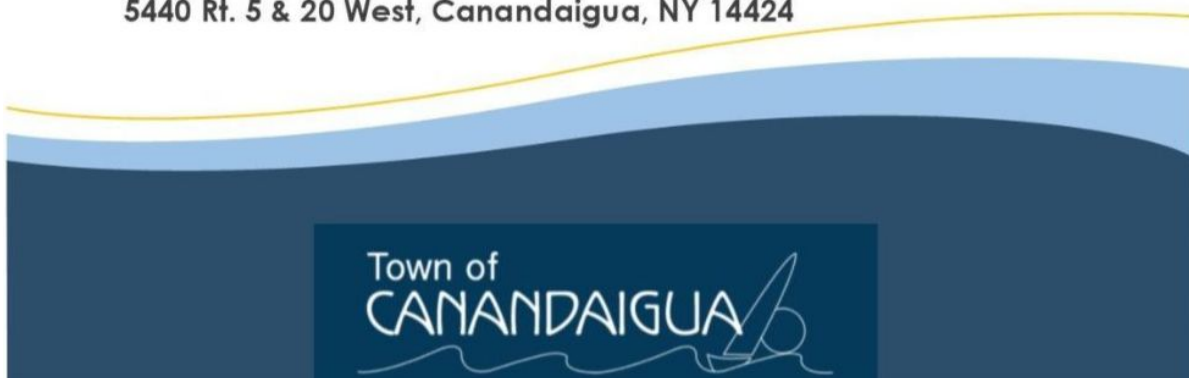
